Happy Easter! What a wonderful time in the Christian Year, the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord. Many Christians don't know that Jesus stayed with His friends for a long time after He was resurrected. Christians today think that Jesus was resurrected and then vanished into heaven. But just the opposite is true. Jesus appeared to hundreds of folks, fellowshipping and teaching and sharing His inner light. Acts 1:3 "To them he presented himself alive after his passion by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days, and speaking of the Kingdom of God."

Of course we understand "forty days" as a Biblical number, therefore symbolic of a "perfect period of time" that Jesus dwelt with His friends. You will find numbers like 40 and 3 and 12 throughout the Bible carrying symbolic or mystical meanings.

The point that many modern Christians miss is that it was Christ's presence, Christ's companionship, Christ's teaching and sharing after His resurrection that indelibly changed the lives of so many people. After fellowshipping with the risen Christ their lives could no longer be the same. Their witness went out to change the entire world. Folks had to tell others about fellowshipping with "the risen" Christ.

That fact, that witness gives us great hope as we read the words of our Master saying: "Fear not, I am the first and the last, and the living one; I died, and behold I am alive for evermore, and I have the keys to Death and Hades." Fear not, Jesus told us. Don't fear death. "I was dead" he says, "and behold I am alive for evermore." That is the power of the Christian life, to know that there is more

just beyond our last breath.

News from Rev. Sheffield... Hearing the Songs of Creation

Many years ago I had the privilege of meeting one whom we called, Grandma DeChant. It was at a camp for high school students in Ohio. Jo Ann and I were camp counselors, and Grandma DeChant was the "Missionary." She introduced me to her memories of her Brother Rev. Clement DeChant who was the pastor of a small church in the mountains of Pennsylvania. Most of the male citizens of that town were employed in the coal mines, and most of them were members of Clement's church. During the last few years of his life Clement was an invalid. He was confined to his bed, which he had moved to the front room of his "shot gun" house, which was right on Main Street. When the men of the town went to work each day they had to pass by Clement's window. He learned to identify each one by the sound of their feet walking by his window. Each day as they passed by he prayed for them, for their safety and for their families, each one by name.

Clement's other task was to write a sermon each week which would be delivered at the church by a Seminary Student from Lancaster Seminary. Such was the love that this congregation had for their pastor. But I need to tell you of another thing that Clement did. He was always writing in a little note book that he always kept with him when he was a healthy robust pastor. He loved the out of doors and he was a great observer of God's creation. His "notebook writings" were, after his death, gathered up by Grandma DeChant and sent to the publishing house of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. They were published in 1952 under the title of "Out of My Heart." Some of these meditative pieces are among the great spiritual poems that I have ever come across in my reading and searching for spiritual beauty. Often times I use them to remind me of the wonder of God and of God's wondrous creation. I share this one in the hope that Clement's story of prayer and concern for his people, and the beauty of his writings may touch your hearts and invite you to a time of prayer and meditation in this holy Lenten season.

The world is rushing on too swiftly toward a fate
We feel with fear. In our mad racing after it
We fall, we're trampled under foot, and left to die.
The pace is far too fast, and our endurance spent...
Oh, just to rest! Find peace again, and Joy!



I'm going to wander off unto a quiet stream
Far from our cruelties, our lies, our stupid boasts-
And then, I'll drift where'er the lazy current leads.
I'll watch the white clouds float across far heaven's blue,
As windowed through the high arched branches of the trees
I'll hear birds sing a hundred different melodies;
And I'll see stones and rocks, and mossy banks and ferns!
Then quietly, beside a deep and shaded pool,
Where hungry, speckled trout refuse my every fly.
I'll laugh again. And in my peace and calm content
I'll hear anew the songs creation sings to me.
I'll lay me down, full length, upon a grassy bank,
Where earth's warm heart will beat in raptured tune with mine.

REFLECTIONS

Close Calls

At one time I was worth over two million dollars! The catch is, however, that it was mine only if I died in a public transportation accident, and the other catch is that the money would go to my three sons in college. The family joke was that they might not want to pray for our safe return under these circumstances.

There are four times when we thought they might collect our insurance! The first time was when we were flying from Western Samoa to Fiji. It was a late afternoon flight, with our destination Nadi, (pronounced Nandi) where all overseas flights landed. Unfortunately, Air Pacific would take us only to Suva, and the final segment to Nadi would require a transfer in Suva.

As we landed in Suva, we found ourselves in the midst of a tropical storm. We assumed we would not take the short flight to Nadi in such bad weather. We were wrong, and dodging the driving rain we made our way to an even smaller plane. By then we could see streaks of lightning, hear the violent wind driving heavy rain on the plane. We took off, and the plane shook, vibrated, struggled to gain altitude. We thought, but did not express our feeling: “we will never make it.” It seemed at times that the plane would be ripped apart by the forces of nature. We did make it to Nadi, but it seemed a minor miracle to us that we did...



A second close call came as we flew in a tiny four-seater plane from the Wycliffe Bible Translators headquarters in Ukaumpa, Papua New Guinea to Telefolmin, near the West Irian border. The lengthy flight took us over mile after mile of dense virgin jungle. I noticed our pilot kept looking down. When I asked what he was looking for, he replied, “Emergency landing spots.” I didn’t see any and was not reassured when he volunteered the information that a number of planes had crashed to the jungle floor and their bodies were never recovered, and the planes were swallowed up in the trees and thick underbrush. Plane remains from World War II had recently been recovered. We were reminded to pray harder by our pilot. Our skilled pilot brought us safely to our destination, but I can still see in my mind the terrain over which we passed.

A third close call came when we were flying home from Darwin, in the northern Territory of Australia. Our flight had originated in Singapore, and the flight plan called for a fueling stop in Cairns before the long haul across the Pacific to Los Angeles. We were the last to board in Darwin, and the flight immediately took off as soon as we were seated. The flight over the desolate terrain of North Australia went without incident, but as we neared the airport in Cairns, the pilot informed us of a problem: the landing lights at Cairns were off! It is hard to imagine a giant Boeing Qantas Airline plane landing in the dark, but we circled the airport several times before the welcome beams of the airport light cut through thick darkness of the humid tropical night.

Probably the scariest flight we ever took was with 12 university students out of Cap Haitian in Haiti. We were at the airport with all our luggage returning home after doing mission work in the Dominican Republic and Haiti. When our plane landed at the open field airport it was evident the pilot had not been notified of the size of the group, and taking one look at the pile of our belongings, shook his head, “No.” There followed animated discussion between the pilot and ground crew, and we stood there anxiously until we saw our possessions loaded. We did not have any other reservations, and the bus trip back to Port au Prince was long and dangerous. Without further deliberation, all 14 of us were soon seated on the Miami-bound flight. Although unaware of this, it could have been the final flight anywhere for all of us.



When we took off in a northerly direction, I could feel the engines laboring under the strain of the overload. As I glanced out my window I could see us skimming over the water beneath, not far from the mountainous coast of Haiti as the plane struggled to gain altitude. Suddenly it dawned

on me that we might crash in the ocean, and were too far from land to make it ashore, even if we survived the crash. Looking at the flight attendant, I saw fear in her eyes as the color fled from her face. Then God answered prayers of many of us as our plane began to lift slowly to the correct altitude, and we continued safely to Miami, and after a change of airlines on to Oklahoma City.

Recently I cancelled my remaining multi-million dollar insurance policies. I have not flown for several years, my sons are on their own, and the insurance companies have saved millions. Yet when I think of the hundred of thousands of miles I have flown, crossing both Atlantic and Pacific Oceans several times, I am convinced that the Lord had a plan for our lives, which not only included serving Him, but which assured me in His plan for our lives never included drowning in an ocean, being lost on a jungle floor or an accidental death.

I remain certain that one who is honestly seeking to follow the Lord by faith will live until that time when the Lord's plan calls for that final journey across Jordan to His Promised Land.



I am grateful to so many here at Grace Church who made our tenth anniversary celebration so very wonderful. Thank you, each and every one of you. The Lovely Ginny and I thank you from the depths of our hearts. I

am grateful to have such a wonderful job, preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and teaching His Word. I would quote our Scots poet, Bobbie Burns for all:

And there's a hand, my trusty fiere,
And gie's a hand o' thine,
And we'll tak a right guid-willie waught
For auld lang syne!

Insights into the “Days of Easter”

Have you ever wondered why we celebrate Maundy Thursday or what are “Movable Feasts and Fasts”? Following are some insights into the “Days of Easter” from *A Concise Dictionary of Ecclesiastical Terms* by The Reverend Frederick L. Eckel, Jr.

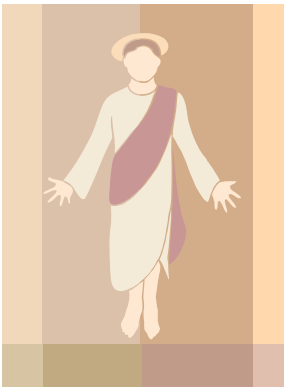
MOVABLE FEASTS AND FASTS: Holy days which are not observed on fixed dates but depend on the variable date of Easter.

MAUNDY THURSDAY: (Latin *mandare*, to command) Thursday in Holy Week, commemorating the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist; the day when Jesus washed the feet of his disciples.

GOOD FRIDAY: The Friday before Easter; the anniversary of the Crucifixion of Christ; “good” because of the atoning sacrifice of the Lord as Saviour of mankind.

PALM SUNDAY: The Sunday preceding Easter; the sixth Sunday in Lent; the first day of Holy Week, commemorating the triumphal entry of Christ into Jerusalem; traditionally symbolized by use of palm decorations and crosses on this day.

EASTER: A moveable feast commemorating the resurrection of Christ; coming in the spring, it symbolizes the resurrection of all nature. Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox (March 21st), except when the full moon falls on Sunday, when Easter is one week later. It controls the Christian year from Septuagesima Sunday through Trinitytide.



CHURCH WORSHIP

Last week Dr. Bridges, my Baptist preacher friend whom several of you all have met at Bible Study, contacted me about an article on the internet by James Alison, titled “Worship in a Violent World.” If you Google, then Google this article. James Alison writes about [why we worship](#). Some of his words are such rich theological thinking that I’d like to share them with you.

He writes: *“God has no desire for us to worship him for his sake; he needs no worship, no adulation, no praise, no glory. No divine ego is flattered, stability maintained, nor is any threatened petulance staved*

off, by our worship. No, the only people for whom it matters that we worship God is ourselves. It is entirely for our benefit that we are commanded to worship God, because if we don’t we will have no protection at all against the other sort of worship. We will allow our hearts to be formed by the desires of the contradictory social order that is around us, and that heart will eventually participate in its own heartbreak and self-destruction. So the insistence on worship, and on prayer is much more like someone outside the gates of a prison giving us, who think we are living in a mansion, gentle hints as to what it’s really like and letting us know how to build the tunnel to get out of the prison, than it is a demand for flattery.”

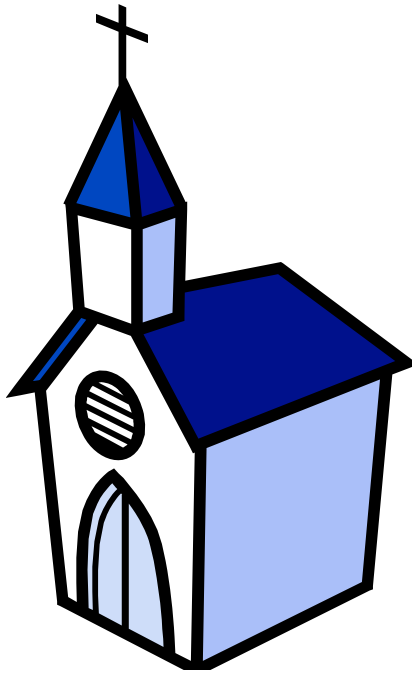
In short, he says that we worship for our own good. For without worship, human beings are inclined to worship the lesser things around us like money, power, prestige, our governments, and our political leaders. He uses the Nuremberg Rally model that Hitler set up in Germany as a source of worship for those who replace worship of God with worldly worship. Those folks who have no regular worship in a place of worship apart from the world are at risk of having the political convention, or the political party, or leader, or political idealism take the place of God’s importance in their lives. I believe that this is why people today are so mean-spirited about their politics. Many folks have no spiritual home. If a party or a candidate represents God’s truth to someone, then it’s ok for that person to be mean-spirited to others about his politics. After all, the politicians represent God to those who don’t worship God as Spirit. Then too, it’s also ok to act outside the boundaries of accepted religious morality to further a political cause, if that cause becomes one’s Ultimate Concern. This is what the Nazis did.

Regular worship protects your soul from centering upon wealth, work, possessions, politics or relationships for soul truth and life. It elevates our consciousness to a place where we can look from above at all of the things of the world and realize that they are passing away.

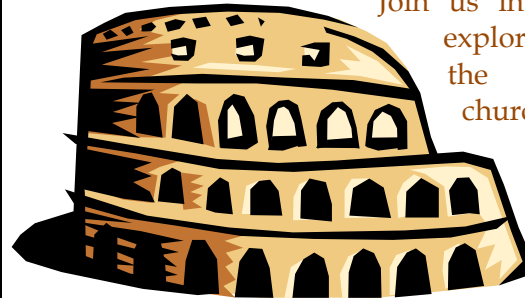

MARY MARTHA CIRCLE

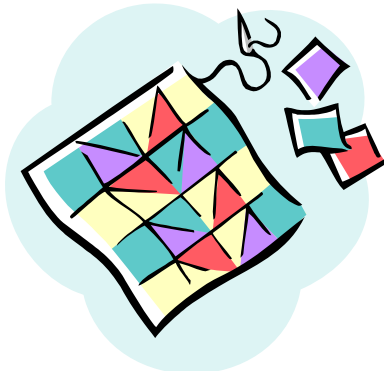

“Come when you can – Leave when you must.”

Thanks to everyone at Grace for supporting our mission. We very much value your encouragement, suggestions, ideas, and supplies. While involved in spring cleaning, or packing up to head north, please keep in mind that we always need quilt batting and clean washed 100% cotton fabric and scraps. Why washed? To prevent uneven shrinkage when the finished quilt is washed.

Why cotton? We know from quilts of our forbearers that cotton holds up extremely well for eons. Many museums display quilts 100, even 200 years old in almost perfect condition. Moreover, cotton is easiest to work with. It happily stays where you stitch it. Blends often insist upon returning to their original size and shape creating unsightly puckers and gathers.

MINI LESSON: How can you tell if fabric is 100% cotton or a blend? Snip off a small piece and in a safe location use a match or candle to light a corner. Quickly blow out the flame. 100% cotton leaves a soft gray ash – polyester becomes hard. The bigger the polyester percentage, the harder the burn area feels.

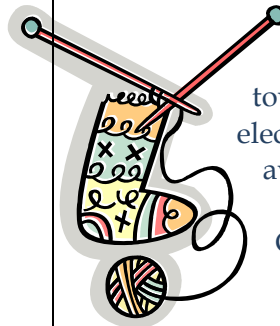

Once again, we crafters, are delighted with the results of our March 8th craft sale. Your support has touched our hearts and blessed the work of our hands.

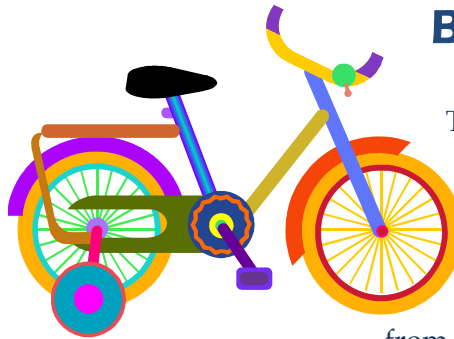


We are pleased to donate \$186 towards the church electric bill, which averages \$1,400 a month.

Bike Ministry



The bike ministry is mainly a “snow bird” activity. That is we generally refurbish bikes

from mid October to about the end of April. It gets too hot to work in the garage during the summer. Most of the bikes we refurbish need new tires, tubes, minor lubrication and adjustments. Some need to have wheels, handlebars, reflectors, seats, and brakes replaced. About 10% of the bikes donated are too expensive to repair, so all useful parts are salvaged and the remainder scrapped. Overall, it costs an average of \$25.00 to \$30.00 for each bike that is ready to be donated. So far this season we have completed 60 bikes, and we expect to complete a few more before we shut down for the season.

In the past the men's group supported the cost of our replacement parts. However, since this group is currently inactive, and since our funds were nearly exhausted, we decided to raffle off 2 of our better bikes at the recent rummage sale. We were pleased to report that we raised \$260 that will allow us to continue our ministry at least until we return in the Fall. If you would like to give a gift to this ministry, please make your check to Grace Presbyterian Church with a notation for *bike ministry*. By the way, we currently have over 40 bikes to refurbish so no more are currently needed.
