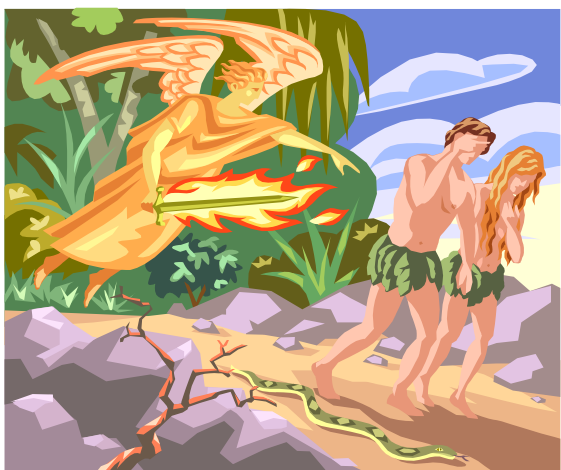

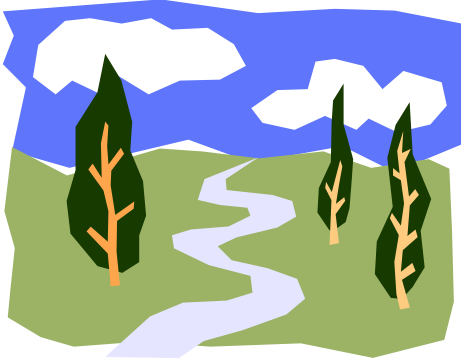

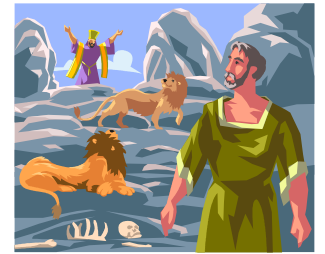
After the meeting one man came to me and said, (he actually almost blurted out) "It was when I was struggling with some problems and I was confused and I couldn't see the pathway ahead and I was young and I didn't know what I wanted to do with my life. And a friend said, 'Just close your eyes and quiet your mind, and let God come to you. Do that regularly and soon you will know what to do, because God loves you and will lead you.' Then he smiled and said, that was forty years ago, and this is the first time I have shared that story with anyone."

That man was a closet evangelist! And he was finally able to talk about his

experience with God.

I want to say to each of you "closet evangelists", "It is OK to share our faith stories with people we know. And we have stories to tell!"

The truth is we have had enough of "Holy Hear-say!" What my faith and your faith needs is to be fed by the stories of Jesus, and our stories of our own experiences of God. I need to hear your reality stories of God's presence and how those experiences have touched your heart.



The reason for that is that belief is of the head...but faith is of the heart. Most of us enter the kingdom of God heart first and our heads come along later with understanding. There is after all a difference between belief and faith.

There was a high wire act, men who had strung a wire between the two sides of a deep canyon. It was announced all around the area that these men would walk that wire on Sunday afternoon, and everyone was invited to come and see them do it.



"How many of you believe we can ride a bicycle across this wire with a chair balanced on two poles that sit on our shoulders?" Those who raised their hands had a belief. "I believe they can do that was what they were saying."

Then the man asked who among them would like to sit in the chair while they rode across the canyon? One young boy raised his hand. He had faith! You see there really is a difference between faith and belief.

We have been called of God, through Jesus Christ, not only to believe, but also to be faithful, that is, full of faith! We are to share the reality of God's presence. We are to tell out of our own experiences, the wonderful deeds of God who has called us out of darkness into his marvelous light! And the reason is: God wants everyone and I mean everyone to be invited into his faith community and into his kingdom. It is God's yearning that all should experience God's present reality and in the process to become whole and complete persons.

So we need to tell our faith stories to each other, but more importantly to those who are outside the faith that they may hear the story of God's eternal presence in the now. So you tell me your stories, and I will tell you mine, and we will all be strengthened with the power of God through faith. May God bless you in these days ahead.

# REFLECTIONS

## PREACHERS ARE HUMAN

Preachers can and do make mistakes. One, who had been an evangelist for several years, decided to further his education by enrolling in college. The opportunity came for him to serve as pastor of a Baptist Church in Geneva, IL, and he was called before an ordination council. One of the deacons asked him if he had read the entire Bible. When he replied in the affirmative the next question was "Have you read the book of Hezekiah?" When he replied "yes" he was asked to read a verse from chapter one. After fumbling badly he realized there was no such book in the Bible!

During the 1930's there was considerable interest in prophecy. One night I heard Dr. Arthur I Brown, at Calvary Baptist Church in Manhattan describe the antichrist. "I won't say Mussolini is the antichrist, but look at these similarities." We went away impressed that the Italian dictator surely must be that evil one. To my chagrin, a few weeks later, he was killed and a mob dragged his dead body through the streets of Rome. I have heard several claim he would be living at the return of Jesus. All have died.

A pastor was preaching at a Youth for Christ meeting in upstate New York. At the beginning of his sermon he admitted, "I owe a few of these thoughts to another." He went ahead and preached, word for word, a famous sermon by Dr. R. G. Lee: *A Dead Dog and a Flea*. Some months later he was preaching at a service in my church and often cited, "The Greek says this..." Assuming he was proficient in the language after the service I asked if I could see his Bible. Very reluctantly he passed it to me and I immediately realized he had been using an interlinear translation, with the words in English directly under the Greek!

A famous youth evangelist was preaching when he commented on how the secular world sometimes stole Christian music, citing the hymn "Search Me, O God". He had heard a secular group sing the "Maori Farewell" and thought that they had stolen it, not realizing the "Maori Farewell" was written many years earlier and had been adapted by Christians with revised lyrics.

A professor was serving as interim pastor of a Texas panhandle church. After one service he was standing outside the door greeting people, and jokingly said to a woman, "Where's that good for nothing husband of yours today?" She burst into tears and said, "Don't you remember? You buried him last week."

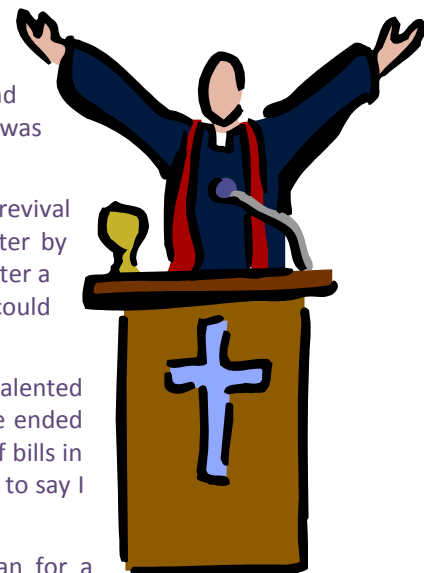
As a teen I heard that "Happy Mac", Dr. Walter MacDonald, was to preach in our church. In the advertising it said he had formerly been with Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians, a noted orchestra of the period. This interested me, so I made sure I attended to hear his life story and how long he has been with Fred Waring. He had nearly finished his message when he paused and said, "By the way, one night I served as M. C. at a party where Fred Waring was playing. To say I was disappointed would be an understatement.

One of my fellow seminary students was a very able preacher and I invited him to conduct a revival meeting. To prepare for the meeting he wanted us to read the entire New Testament, chapter by chapter, alternating the chapters. When we finished he said, "Let's pray and confess our sins." After a long pause he finally recalled one sin. "I might have kept a library book out too long." Although I could have easily pointed out some others I saw in him to him, I kept my silence.

One of my members urged us to book an African-American trio from Florida. They were a talented group, but after I received the offering for them they took the meeting over. Before the service ended they took, on their own, three separate offerings and at the close invited the congregation to stuff bills in their pockets on the way out, "so we can give them to needy pastors in the Caribbean". Needless to say I never invited them to return!

We were fortunate to secure the famous pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in Manhattan for a meeting. Each night he spoke of the "great" Calvary Baptist Church, and each night he made us look smaller and smaller in comparison. "Small, rural, little" were some of the adjectives applied to our 400 member church. When he left at the close of a very successful meeting I handed him a check for the love offering, and his last words were "Not bad for a small church". The check was five times larger than my salary, and he had all expenses covered in addition.

Preachers are human, and make their share of mistakes. However some of the most humble, dedicated, and sincere people I know are pastors and I am proud to call them friends. Support your pastors in prayer, cooperation, and love. Should they sometimes make mistakes, remember that they are human, and only Christ is perfect.

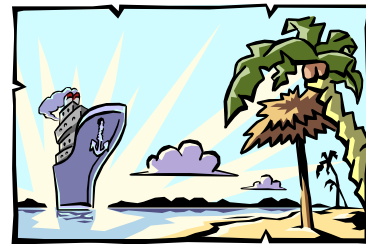
